



Oversupply of College Graduates

The percent of the U.S. population with a college degree has grown steadily since 1950, from just over 5% to 30% in 2010 (see chart below). This has led to an oversupply of college graduates flooding the workplace, yet only about 37% of jobs require a bachelor's degree. There are not enough college level jobs for all the college graduates. This oversupply has adverse consequences. According to Richard Vedder, 48% of college graduates are in occupations that don't require a college degree - 37% of those require only a high school degree or less (see chart below). They are <u>under</u> employed.


Persons 25 Years or Older with College Degrees, 1950-2010
